Commentary

Our portfolio underperformed the Credit Suisse Leveraged Loan Index during the month. The largest detractor across asset types was security selection within the bank loan segment, though this was slightly offset by our allocation to secured bonds, which outperformed loans as interest rates generally fell across the curve. From a sector perspective, selection within financials and services contributed positively to relative returns, while the largest detractor was our allocation to, and selection within, the technology sector.

A bevy of economic data in the month continued to support the broader narrative that the US economy remains resilient, though relatively benign readings in employment and inflation contributed to a rally in Treasury rates across the curve. The US unemployment rate ticked up slightly to 4%—a level not seen since January 2022—suggesting slight cooling in the labor market while investors viewed recent inflation readings positively (for the consumer price index and core personal consumption expenditures price index). Against this backdrop, leveraged loans (as measured by the Credit Suisse Leveraged Loan Index) gained roughly 30bps, bringing their year-to-date performance to 4.4%. Treasury rate volatility continued in the month as market participants digested data releases and Federal Reserve comments, with the 10-Year Treasury yield falling nearly 30bps in the first two weeks of June before rising to end the month 10bps below May—aiding total returns for fixed rate bonds in the process.

During the month, discount margins widened roughly 12bps at the index level, leading to a slight decline in the average price of the index from 96.1 to 95.7. Across credit quality categories, there continues to be significant dispersion of performance, particularly in recent months; the "split B" rated category of the loan benchmark lost 80bps in June while the "CCC/Split CCC" category gained nearly 50bps. On a year-to-date basis, the divergence between the two categories is material, with CCC gaining nearly 9% while the split B category has returned only 2%—highlighting the importance of credit selection and portfolio construction.

Primary issuance continues to be strong, particularly in leveraged loans, which recorded their second-most active month on record (following record-setting new issuance in May). Roughly \$18 billion of bonds and \$150 billion of loans priced during the month, though over 80% of bond and 90% of loan issuance in June was refinancing or repricing driven. Net new credit creation remains limited, technically supported by robust demand with mutual fund flows across high yield bonds and leveraged loans remaining positive year-to-date. Defaults were muted in June with the lowest par value of defaults or distressed exchanges in nearly a year. However, there is a growing divergence between "hard" defaults (missed payments and bankruptcies) and "soft" defaults (liability management exercises ("LMEs") and distressed exchanges)—with the latter beginning to outnumber the former. The rise of LMEs can create opportunities for investors willing to dig deep into credits to find the optimal point in a given capital structure and maximize value.

As the first half of 2024 comes to a close, allocators continue to be faced with a myriad of uncertainties surrounding the economy, monetary policy and geopolitics. Leveraged loans have once again proven their value within a diversified portfolio, providing investors with positive total returns year-to-date driven less by equity market sentiment and more by credit fundamentals. In this environment, our emphasis remains the same as it has since inception constructing well-researched, high-conviction portfolios with an unwavering focus on business quality.

Portfolio Construction

A high-conviction portfolio comprised primarily of floating rate debt instruments that are attractively valued. At least 80% will be invested in floating rate leveraged loans, which could include, among other types of loans, senior secured loans, unsecured loans, second lien loans, bridge loans and junior loans. The portfolio has a bias toward US issuers but has the ability to invest globally. It also has flexibility to invest across the quality spectrum, in various industries and issuance sizes.
